Vocabulary

Infinitive: a verb that has not been conjugated (put into a tense). The verb form found in the dictionary (-ar, -er, ir)

Tense: A time frame telling us when the action takes place and which changes the verb.

Present: What you are doing now or usually do, e.g. vivo = I live/I am living

Present Continuous: Saying what you are doing at the moment, e.g. estoy bebiendo - I am drinking (right now)

Near future: saying what is going to happen. E.g. voy a visitor = I am going to visit

Preterite Tense: used to say what you did (completed action), e.g. viajé a - I travelled to..)

Imperfect Tense: used to say what you used to do or for describing things in the past, e.g. el hotel era.. - the hotel was..

Perfect Tense: used to talk about what you *have done* e.g. he jugado – I have played...

Object pronouns - replace the noun which has just been mentioned, it agrees with the noun it replaces (lo/la/los/las)
