The Elements of Music: rhythm, pitch, melody, tempo, articulation, timbre/sonority, structure/form, texture, harmony, dynamics & silence

Ostinato/Riff: a repeated rhythm or

Vocabulary & Definitions

Syncopation: the 'stress' of the rhythm falls in-between the main beats. Pentatonic Scale: 'pent' associated with the number '5', a 5 note scale.

Modes: 'Dorian' - white keys D-D, 'Aeolian Mode' uses white keys A-A, 'Tonian' uses C-C. Drone: continuous note, can be sustained

Call & Response: a musical conversation. Hijaz Scale: an important scale used in Northern Africa, flattened 2nd, 6th and 7th notes of the major scale.

Monophonic Texture: 'mono', one melody, nothing else around it.

Polyrhythms: 'poly' more than one rhythm played together at the same time.

Song Form: sections in a song - chorus, verse, bridge...
